

## STRATEGIES FOR FUTURE PREPAREDNESS:

Examining the Impact of COVID-19 in Nashville


As the nation and world continue to grapple with COVID-19, there is much to learn about how to improve health preparedness protocols for the general public, front-line workers, and healthcare facilities of all forms; support small and large businesses in crises; implement emergency preparedness plans for schools; and coordinate testing and vaccine services.

Nashville is one of the first communities in the nation to do a comprehensive review of lessons learned from Nashville's health, business and community response to the pandemic.

Through a series of wide-ranging interviews with key leaders and stakeholders, along with extensive research, NashvilleHealth and partners produced a report that reviews Nashville's response to the pandemic and importantly, offers recommendations to inform and prepare for future emergency response.

The report explores 5 key areas of community response and then offers 28 short, medium, and long-term recommendations and action items to be considered by hospitals, community-based organizations, government, researchers, non-profits, and business leaders for any future public health emergency.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

- Emphasize and prioritize regular investments in our public health infrastructure and crisis readiness.
- Elevate supports for Nashville's most vulnerable populations based on unique needs.
- Align protocols and best practices across Nashville's thriving business and tourism community.
- Elevate leaders of Nashville's minority faith communities as key influencers and trusted representatives for information sharing and emergency response.
- Develop improved and standardized data sharing among health providers for better care coordination and outcomes.
- Create easy-to-use and mobile-friendly online portals and dashboards for residents and businesses to use for testing, vaccinations, and applying for economic relief, as well as following progress on pandemic preparedness metrics.
